ADULT SERVICES



The program welcomes and coordinates care for adults aged 18 and older who are diagnosed with a serious mental illness (SMI), many with co-occurring substance use disorders and helps to maintain stability in the community, foster independence and maximize individual potential.

Adults may receive services if they have had a diagnosable mental, behavioral or emotional disorder of sufficient duration currently or at any time during the past year and has varying degrees and durations of impairment in several areas including family relationships, interpersonal relations, maintaining employment, conducting daily living chores, maintaining basic needs such as hygiene and preparing food, and/or involvement in the criminal justice system.

- Triage – intake, assessment & screening
- Psychiatric evaluations, medication management, nursing assessments, psychological testing, case management, community support services, treatment planning, crisis intervention, individual group & family therapy
- Integrated health care – coordinated care with primary care physicians that supports total wellness
- Peer Delivered Support – behavioral health persons who assist their peers in their recovery
- Supportive Housing – affordable housing, including Section 8 & other rent subsidies, for eligible individuals, families, veterans and the homeless
- Supported Employment – assists in obtaining meaningful, rewarding & competitive jobs

- Assertive Community Treatment – services for dually diagnosed adults with a history of noncompliance & hospitalizations (24-hour crisis access to staff)
- AFC Residential/Case Management – services persons in dependent living situations
- Hospital Liaison Services – includes discharge planning for adults hospitalized with a psychiatric crisis
- ASPIRE ID/DD (Intellectual Disabilities/Developmental Disabilities) – services to persons of all ages diagnosed with a lifelong condition or disability
- Community & Police Partnership Advocacy (CAPP) – jail diversion collaboration for individuals in the law enforcement system, including outreach & police training
- Youth in Transition – for adults between the ages of 17 & 26 to provide tools, information and support to recover as positive role models
- Motor City Clubhouse – an environment of recovery & support following a psychosocial model and work-ordered day
- Senior Reach® – identifies at-risk older adults living in the community to support their well-being and independence
- Community Outreach for Psychiatric Emergencies (C.O.P.E.) – provides 24-hour community-based services for adults in psychiatric crisis
- Mental Health First Aid – training certification course which teaches participants to assess a situation, select and implement interventions and secure appropriate care for the individual
